Message from the Minister of Transportation

Alberta's commercial vehicle industry plays a vital role in our province's economy, by providing Albertans with the goods and services we need every day. As always, it's my pleasure to provide you with an update on the latest developments taking place on Alberta highways.

Winter Highway Safety

With winter bearing down on us, it's important to be prepared. Safety begins before you get on the road. Make sure your maintenance inspections are current and get in the habit of checking road conditions with 511 Alberta.

511 Alberta has the information you need to make informed travel decisions. This fall, 511 Alberta added traffic cameras on Deerfoot Trail to its roster and began reporting road conditions in all three mountain parks (Jasper National Park, Banff National Park and Waterton Lakes National Park). In all, 138 cameras provide Albertans with upto-date information on highway conditions around the year. We know it takes skill to safely operate a big truck, something that many motorists do not understand. The drivers of smaller passenger vehicles often make decisions that put themselves and the commercial vehicle at risk.

From 2009 to 2013, 2,389 truck tractors were involved in casualty collisions in Alberta. There were 222 people killed and 2,841 people injured in these collisions. The deaths include 25 truck-tractor drivers, 10 of whom were killed in single vehicle rollover crashes.

Alberta Transportation, working with a number of partners across the province, launches monthly traffic safety campaigns including commercial vehicle safety, distracted driving and seatbelt usage. We'll keep working to get the message out to all drivers to make good decisions on the road when maneuvering around heavy vehicles. Construction Update

2015 marked an especially busy period of highway construction in Alberta as a number of major projects reached important milestones:

TWINNING OF HIGHWAY 63

This year, the Government of Alberta opened 99 per cent (237 kilometres) of twinned highway between Grasslands and Fort McMurray, with the completion of the rest by fall of 2016.

ANTHONY HENDAY DRIVE

This year marks the third of a four year construction period in the construction of the Northeast (and final) leg of

Edmonton's Ring Road, Anthony Henday Drive. It is on track for completion in 2016 and the Alberta government has committed more than \$4 billion toward construction of the ring road, including \$1.81 billion for the northeast section. Once fully open to traffic, the Anthony Henday will be a key driver in economic activity in the Capital Region, allowing the free-flow of both motorists and goods.

SOUTHWEST CALGARY RING ROAD

After reaching a historic agreement with the Tsuu T'ina Nation in 2014, planning continues on the Southwest leg of Calgary's Ring Road. This planning has included consultations with the City of Calgary and other organizations interested in the project. Upon completion, the Calgary Ring Road will have more than 100 kilometres of free-flow freeway, which will reduce local traffic congestion and improve market access.

- You monitor your company's on-road safety performance by reviewing your Carrier Profile.

DID YOU KNOW?



Effective January 1, 2016 the penalty for distracted driving in Alberta will increase to \$287.

Upon conviction of an offence that occurred on or after January 1, 2016 drivers will receive 3 demerit points on their Driver Abstract and Commercial Driver Abstract.

Upon conviction of an offence that occurred on or after January 1, 2016 carriers operating commercial vehicles regulated under Alberta's National Safety Code Program will have 3 points applied to distracted driving violations displayed on their Carrier Profile Reports.

Hours of service permit changes

On February 1, 2015, the Oilfield Driver Awareness (ODA) course developed by ENFORM replaced the General Oilfield Driver Improvement (GODI) and Light Duty Vehicle (LDV) courses.

With this replacement, the following changes will be made to the Federal Oilwell Service Vehicle Cycle Exemption Permit:

- Beginning January 1, 2016, the application and conditions associated with the permit will be changed and will require drivers to have received ODA (or equivalent) training prior to operating under the permit.
- Beginning January 1, 2016, permit holders will no longer be required to train drivers in the Oilfield Hauler (OH) (or equivalent) course.

- On April 1, 2016, all drivers operating under the permit will be required to produce proof of training in hours of service requirements, fatigue management requirements, and ODA (or equivalent).
- On June 1, 2016, a new permit application will be introduced that will require submission of fatigue management programs.

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Year in review: NSC carriers

As of December 31, 2015, a total of **26,292** National Safety Code (NSC) carriers were operating in the province of Alberta.

This is a two per cent decrease in the number of carriers from 2014.

Of these NSC carriers:

- 1,789 operated buses;
- 24,503 operated trucks;
- 8,696 operated with a Federal Operating Status; and
- 17,596 carriers operated with a Provincial Operating Status.

These carriers were responsible for the operation of over **152,000** commercial vehicles.

Of these commercial vehicles:

- 2,984 were federally regulated buses;
- 16,463 were provincially regulated buses;

- 78,650 were federally regulated trucks;
- 54,878 were provincially regulated

24 per cent of all NSC regulated vehicles operating in Alberta were registered to a fleet with fewer than five vehicles.

Between January and December, 2015 Carrier Services issued:

- 2,916 new Safety Fitness Certificates;
- 224 new Operating Authorities; and
- 239 permits (e.g. those related to Hours of Service, Gas and Water Well Service Exemptions, and Divided Record Authorities).
